

DEFAULT GROUP A

Thank you for deciding to take part in this research! Your answers will help us design a better survey for people in East Africa who identify as LGBT.

1. What are some of the challenges you face when you are trying to make healthy decisions when you play sex? We mean things like getting and using condoms, getting HIV tests, and things like that.
2. What is something that you think would be important for us to know to understand your transgender experience? The more detail you can provide, the better.

OPTIONAL GROUP B

We want to be sure that the words we use in the survey are easy to understand and are respectful.

1. Do you think words like “transgender” or “genderqueer” describe you well? Are there better words that better describe how you see yourself? Why?
2. We want to use words that people understand. What other words may be used more often than “penis”, “anus”, and “vagina”? What words do you use to describe sex?
3. We also want to use language in the health survey that is respectful. What words are offensive to you that we should not use in the survey?

OPTIONAL GROUP C

We have some questions about what it is like to be a transgender person in East Africa.

Remember that your answers are completely private. You can post safely here.

1. What does it mean to be someone who is transgender and African? We mean things like: What society says, what your friends say, what your family says about African transgender people?
2. How much of the time do you try to ‘pass’ for your birth sex? What is it like for you?
3. Who, if anyone knows, that you are transgender? What was it like for you to come out? How did the other person react when you came out to them?

OPTIONAL GROUP D

We have some questions about the romantic relationships you have had. Your participation is anonymous – please feel safe to post honestly.

1. How do you meet people who you might want to play sex with? How do you meet people you might want to start a romantic relationship with?
2. How is it different for people who are transgender to meet romantic and sexual partners than people who are not transgender?
3. What do healthy relationships look like for you?
4. What do **un**healthy relationships look like for you?

OPTIONAL GROUP E

The survey will include questions about how people get medical care when they need it, and your stories will help make sure that the questions ask about the right things.

1. Some people who are African and transgender have experienced a lot of discrimination, including around their sexuality and sexual behaviours. If you have experienced discrimination, please share a story to describe what it is like for you.
2. Please talk about how choices you make are affected by concerns you might have about discrimination, or how people might treat you? I am thinking about things like: deciding not to get medical care, avoiding school or work, among other things.
3. Describe the last time you needed medical care or wanted to see someone like a nurse or a doctor. Did you go to a health centre? If so, how did the people at the clinic treat you?
